Abstract: Doctor's use of medical terms is generally considered to be one of the reasons for patients' poor comprehension of medical information. This study manipulated the use of Chinese medical terms in a simulated clinical consultation, to investigate its effects on patients' comprehension of medical information and their confidence for seeking further information.
