The Battle of the Teutoburg Forest was not Rome's worst defeat ("greatest defeat" sounds odd, since no defeat is "great"). Varus lost between 15,000 and 20,000 troops in that battle. But the Romans lost twice that many soldiers at the Battle of Cannae in 216 B.C. when Hannibal decimated the Roman army sent to crush him, and following that battle Hannibal controlled a sizable chunk of Italy for a number of years.
