Swiss Darning. For repairing garments when the fabric is still intact, but worn, Swiss darning is the ideal technique. Following the path of the knitted yam with a blunt tapestry needle threaded with yarn, you reinforce the fabric invisibly. The technique may also be used to add different colored stitches to plain knitting.

**How to stitch on knitting: Swiss Darning explained**

Swiss darning is a way of embroidering a stitch that looks like a knit stitch therefore perfect to work on knitted fabric. It is mostly used to work single motifs or to cover small areas in contrast colour on knitted background. For that reason, it can also be included when working in Fair Isle or Intarsia techniques.
